Building a Competitive Future for Invasive Plant Species Research in the Northeast

USDA Beltsville Agricultural Research Center Campus, Maryland March 21-22, 2012

Throughout the Northeastern U.S., research scientists and extension professionals from land grant universities and experiment stations are actively involved with programs focused on invasive plant species. There is excellent potential that these research and outreach efforts by our land-grant institutions can be greatly enhanced and leveraged by coordination at the regional level.

The USDA and other federal agencies emphasize and encourage a multidisciplinary approach to research through greater collaborative efforts not only among different institutions but also among diverse disciplinary groups (e.g., biophysical sciences and social sciences). This includes an enhanced integration of research and extension efforts for solving many of the challenges that fall under their purview.

This forum emphasizes multidisciplinary networking. Scientists from multiple disciplines and land grant functions will define opportunities for regionally coordinated research and extension programs in support of invasive plant species management in the Northeast. Specifically, the forum's goal is to define those areas most likely to provide opportunities in the near future and begin to prepare teams of individuals to aggressively pursue extramural funding associated with those defined areas. The immediate outcome of this forum will be the development of one or more multistate projects.
