Jocelyn G. Brown oversees USDA's international food and technical assistance programs, including the McGovern-Dole Food for Education and Child Nutrition Program, the Food for Progress Program, the Cochran and Borlaug Fellowship Programs, and numerous technical assistance projects that promote U.S. government food security and trade capacity building goals. Before serving as Deputy Administrator, she covered trade policy issues for Asia, Africa and the Middle East, concentrating on China, India, and Africa Growth and Opportunity Act agricultural policy issues. She was also heavily involved in the development of USDA's food security policy for the Group of Eight and Group of Twenty negotiations. During 2010, she implemented the first Feed the Future strategy for post-earthquake Haiti, and worked directly for the Secretary of State's Hillary Clinton's Chief of Staff. From 1998-2006, she worked directly with international organizations such as the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation in Agriculture. Prior to coming to USDA in 1998, she worked the District of Columbia Control Board when the city was under receivership and negotiated the city's largest municipal bond sale ever. She was a Peace Corps volunteer at the Northwest Frontier Province Agriculture University in Peshawar, Pakistan from 1988-1990. She holds an MBA with a concentration in international development from George Washington University and graduated *magna cum laude* from Harvard University in American Literature.
