Strategy 3: Paid Internships

Penn State University

- Conducted review of academic & practical literature
- Assembled list of "promising practices"
- Interns at Pittsburgh site summers 2013, 2014, 2015
- Key: "Internship triangle" between intern(s), site supervisor & academic advisor
- Cross-disciplinary intern pairs = collaborative learning

Strategy 4: Engaging students in teaching and research

- Trainees at all levels
- Engaged through multiple venues
- Across 7 universities and USDA
- Encouraged full participation in project
- Cross-institution collaborations emerged
- Networks grew beyond trainees' institution

Student survey

To capture the learning that occurs among students and trainees engaged in the project

- Idea emerged midway through project
- Included undergrads, grad students, and postdocs
- Sent to 48 individuals engaged in EFSNE research, teaching, or outreach
- Survey completed in summer 2015
